Q & A with Holly Caron, Marketing Director and co-owner of Alfred Matthews

Q: A little about your role at Alfred Matthews? And, what did you do before you purchased the dealership?

A: Paul has been in the car business almost 28 years. His specialty was going into ailing businesses and turning them around so that they were profitable once again. There are so many ways to get involved and we invite all our members to join us.

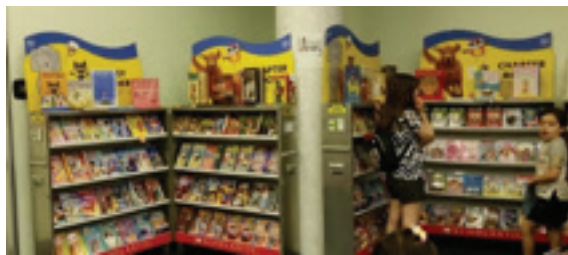

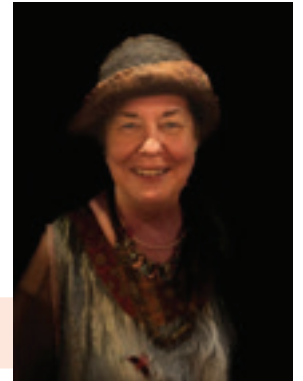

Discover & Go is a partnership between libraries and cultural institutions. With a Stanislaus County Library card, you can reserve FREE and discounted passes to local museums and cultural attractions through the Discover & Go online portal.

- Adults residing in Stanislaus County and ages 18 and over with a library card in good standing can reserve Discover & Go passes.
- You can have up to 2 active reservations at a time.
- You can make reservations up to 3 months in advance.
- All free tickets are first come, first served, until all tickets are exhausted for the month. New passes are released at the beginning of the month.
- Some venues have placed a 1-pass-per-year restriction and you will only be able to reserve those passes once per calendar year.
- Read all the details on each venue before making a reservation.
- The pass is only valid for the name and date on the pass. Valid photo ID is required.

How to Reserve a Museum Pass

1. Visit Discover & Go and log in using your library card number and PIN
2. Browse by museum or date
3. Make a reservation by selecting a date and venue
4. Shortly before your visit, print out your pass.

Used Book Sale was a Record-Breaker!

Thanks to everyone who contributed to the success of this year's Used Book Sale. It was obviously a labor of love for all volunteers. An especially loud "shout out" to Cathie Peck, Marilyn and Tom Drew, and others who were on hand for many of the "sorting parties" prior to the sale. Michael Leamy selected high-value books and listed them online for sale (see related article).

On sale day, Library Branch Supervisor Chris Moreno and his helpers were hard at work by 6:30 a.m., setting up tables and getting the portico ready for all volunteers. Chris even arranged to have the portico power washed prior to our sale. McGrath Moving and Storage brought a large moving van to the warehouse on Friday, loaded the van and took it to the Library Loading Dock. On Saturday morning, they helped the volunteers get the books from the dock to the portico and at the end

of the day they took the leftovers back to the warehouse.

This year, we raised in excess of \$4,300 in book sales and donations. WOW!

Good publicity and delightful weather also contributed to the success of the sale. Beard Land Development, who donated warehouse space and set up book cases along one wall to aid us in sorting, is also allowing us to use the space to store approximately 100 boxes of leftover books for the remainder of the year! Their patience as they opened the door for us on many occasions for sorting was appreciated.

We need someone to serve as co-chair for next year's sale. This would involve assisting in picking up books and scheduling sorting sessions as needed. (209) 985-7156

MJC Library Digital Collections website houses historical student-created publications

Do you have an interest in the history of Modesto Junior College? Maybe a family member graduated from this institution 60 or 70 years ago—or longer—and you'd like to see if the school newspaper or yearbook mentioned her or perhaps published a photograph of her. In the past, this task required a visit to the East Campus Library & Learning Center where one could spend hours, maybe even days, thumbing through sometimes fragile pages in the archives to search for information. Now it's much easier.

The library, with help from the MJC Foundation, allocated funds in late 2016 to digitize both the yearbook and newspaper collections. The annual yearbook began publication at the end of the first school year—1921/1922; the final edition was published in 1963. The newspapers were published regularly from 1926 through 2010. These student publications provide an interesting look at the history of MJC and the surrounding communities. As you read, you'll find names you recognize

from street signs in town and from local businesses. Many of Modesto's prominent citizens were once students of Modesto Junior College.

The yearbook collection contains 4,976 scanned and searchable pages. The newspaper collection contains 15,592. To view the MJC Library Digital Collections, go to <https://cdm17235.contentdm.oclc.org>. Visitors to the site can browse one or both collections by date. If looking for specific information, they can do a basic search of the collections or an advanced search to narrow a large result set.

Viewing on a large monitor may be desirable to more easily see large newspaper pages. But the website, hosted by OCLC's CONTENTdm, is responsive, meaning it is designed to work on screens of all sizes. So don't worry if you're not at your computer workstation, just grab your phone, tablet, or laptop and take a peek into MJC's past.

Book Club in a Box

Do you belong to a book club? Are you looking for titles to read? Did you know you can borrow a box of books, complete with discussion questions, free, from the library? This service, provided by the 49-99 Library Consortium of which Stanislaus County Library is a part, makes it easy to check out enough copies for your club members without them having to purchase or borrow the books individually. Some titles also have a large print copy or audio copies included.

Library Volunteer Carol Blomquist helps coordinate the program and prepare books for checkout. Blomquist, who started at the Salida Library in 2004 as Salida Regional Children's Librarian, served in Turlock and Ceres as regional librarian then returned to Salida as Regional Librarian and branch manager in November 2015. "Currently I work on selecting titles, finding annotations and discussion questions for the titles and help with checking in boxes that have been returned and preparing boxes to go out to book clubs," she says.

Book Club in a Box is one of the Library's most popular programs. "People like the fact that a set of books arrives for the book club to use so copies of the title don't have to be purchased or requested from different libraries. They also like that discussion questions are provided," says Blomquist.

Each branch has a person who deals with Book Club in a Box and can answer questions. A book club may request a title to use for a book club meeting. The number of copies available

is listed on the bibliography that is available on the library website.

Something to consider if your book club is thinking of checking out a Book Club in a Box title: many book clubs use the service so flexibility in requesting titles is important. "Since this is a 49-99 program, book clubs in San Joaquin County, Lodi, Calaveras County, Amador County, and Tuolumne County have access to Book Club in a Box services," says Blomquist. "Therefore, it is a good idea to have a first, second, and third choice for a book club discussion date so the library staff person booking titles for the club has some 'wiggle room.'"

Blomquist is constantly working on building new sets of titles to add to the bibliography. "Customers can help with this when they donate copies in good condition of titles for sets we are building," she says. Some titles currently being collected for sets include,

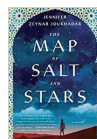
