



LIBRARY TAX UPDATE



The Library Tax measure, which was tentatively scheduled to go before voters for re-approval in June 2017, has been postponed until November. This was the decision of County personnel, based on cost considerations — mid-year elections are very expensive — and the fact that no other measures are anticipated in June.

This is GOOD NEWS for library supporters! It means we have even more time to educate voters and remind them that:

- The Stanislaus County Library and its 13 branches are funded primarily by the 1/8-cent Library Sales Tax, which provides 88% of the Library's operating costs
- The current tax will expire in June 2018; without this reliable, dedicated funding source, LIBRARIES WILL CLOSE.
- This is NOT A NEW TAX, but simply a renewal of the current tax, which has been approved



and re-approved by voters every few years since 1995.

She is on the board of directors of Modesto-Stanislaus Poetry Center. Stella and fellow poets Sam Pierstorff, Gillian Wegener and Ed Bearden coedited the collection "More Than Soil, More Than Sky: The Modesto Poets" (Quercus Review Press, 2011).

Collection Services


Months before you discover the latest bestseller at the library, Stanislaus County Library's Collection Services (CSV) is at work to ensure the book is available for you as soon as it is released.

CSV, housed in the Modesto Library basement, has two functions: acquisition of all materials (books, books on CDs, DVDs, large prints, magazines, etc.) done by the acquisition team, and cataloging and processing of the materials, accomplished by Technical Services staff. The department has seven staff members, 3.5 in Acquisitions and 3.5 in Technical Services. CSV staff work with selectors to purchase, catalog and process materials for all 13 libraries.

Small though the department might be, it is busy! During the 2015-16 fiscal year the department ordered, cataloged and processed over 51,000 items.

Stacey Chen, above right, head of CSV since 2008, says the selectors build a dynamic collection for each of the county's 13 libraries through a thoughtful process to serve the county's residents. They read reviews of books months before their publication and make careful decisions to place them in different branches to best serve the public. Stacey, who focuses on selecting adult fiction, notes that each branch has its own character and readership that reflect the community it serves. She draws on her 21 years of experience in the Stanislaus County Library system to make the best decisions for each of the libraries.

To stay in touch, selectors visit branches on a regular basis to learn about the communities and their needs.



Salida Library, for instance, serves a younger population, so its collection has an emphasis on children's materials. Customers and library staff feedback are important, as are other factors such as demand for certain books, popular genres for different branches, new trends in publications and branch shelving space.

New materials are ordered two months ahead of publication date so that customers can find them in the catalog to place holds. With materials arriving almost daily, Stacey says it is like Christmas every day. Once a shipment is unpacked and checked against the receipt, technical service staff catalogues and processes them. This involves affixing bar codes, applying plastic clear covers, and linking each item to the proper branch. They are then ready to be delivered to the libraries. Materials with customer holds have first priority. Often the distributor will send the most popular materials a few days earlier so the cataloguing and processing can be completed and the book can be available for the customers on the street date.




The so-called CSV (Comma Separated Values) format is the most common import and export format for spreadsheets and databases. There is no "CSV standard", so the format is operationally defined by the many applications which read and write it. The lack of a standard means that subtle differences often exist in the data produced and consumed by different applications. These differences can make it annoying to process CSV files from multiple sources.

Here's the inside scoop on what is trending at the Stanislaus County Library:

Adult Fiction – mysteries and thrillers, romance, inspirational, historical, and biographical fiction. Adult Non-Fiction – politics, fitness and nutrition, cooking, biographies, and history. Children's – easy chapter books and tweens (10- to 12-year-olds). Young adults can find a lot of fantastic material on the shelves, some of which are being made into movies.



Rosemary Wells is the author of more than 120 books. She has won numerous awards and is an inspirational speaker. Her unforgettable animal characters — bunnies Max and his sister Ruby, kitty Yoko and mouse characters like Sophie and Noisy Nora — are familiar companions in many homes.

Wells will read and sign her books for children and their families at Modesto Library on the morning of April 3 and then speak to adults that evening at the Petersen Event Center on the ideas in her 1998 book *“Read to Your Bunny”* and her new book *“Hand In Hand.”*

Both books help parents see how to model being a “first teacher” using books to talk, sing and play with their children in their earliest development toward school readiness. Parents, teachers and childcare providers who attend her workshop will find practical ideas to engage with their children. (Call Children’s Room at 209-558-7810 for details.)

Early literacy activities are not the norm in many homes. The Friends of the Modesto Library [FOML] sponsors Día every year to highlight the importance of books for children’s success. FOML will give a new, free book to any child who attends this year’s April 1 Día event at the Modesto Library. Book collecting and sorting continues through mid-April. Sorting and storage space is being donated by Beard Land Development Company. McGrath Moving & Storage will move the boxes from the Beard office to the library.

Here's a new opportunity you might be interested in: identifying high value books for resale online. Let Maree know if you are interested.

Pat will work on day-of logistics. Volunteer opportunities include:

- Setup the day of (6 – 7 a.m.) and boxing up after the sale (3 – 4 p.m.)
- Staffing the book sale in 2-hr. shifts beginning at 7 a.m.






