READS! is a multi-agency, multi-year initiative to find solutions to help children in Stanislaus County read and succeed by third grade. By fourth grade, students no longer learn to read, they must read to learn. The Stanislaus County Library system is one of the partners in Stanislaus READS!

This topic is near and dear to the hearts of the Friends of the Modesto Library. In this issue we will share with you a closer look at the community partners' critical areas of concentration to reach their goal: school readiness, attendance, summer learning, family engagement and community involvement beyond the school room. You will learn what Stanislaus Libraries is doing to achieve the initiative's goals and about a new library project targeting early childhood literacy for at risk-children in off-site community settings. This action plan gives hope to Stanislaus County's reading-challenged children to achieve academic and lifelong success.

Read With Your Child

When you read together, you can help with tough words and ask questions that

engage your child in the experience of reading a book. Ask about illustrations and discuss the story. Remember: there's no right or wrong answer. It's about encouraging your child to think about what she or he is reading.

How is the library involved?

Stanislaus County Libraries is one of the five founding members of the coalition organizing Stanislaus READS! <u>www.StanReads.org</u> to address the low literacy rate in our county. The Library, as the one public educational institution dedicated to early literacy, is involved in several ways to help assure that our children can read at grade level by the end of third grade. The two main elements of its involvement are Summer Slide and School Readiness.

LIBRARY PROGRAMS

SUMMER SLIDE

The Library's Summer Reading program is probably the institution's best known piece of Stanislaus READS! Teens and children read or were read to for nearly 50,000 hours among participants at the 13 branches in 2015! Reading logs and the small incentives offered to meet



target reading goals encouraged children, teens - and their parents - to make daily reading part of the months between school years. With generous support from the non profit Stanislaus Library Foundation, the program is available throughout the county to help make sure student reading levels do not drop off over the summer.

SCHOOL READINESS

No matter what the economic status or opportunities of a child's family, the Library offers everyone resources, role modeling, and encouragement in the formative years from birth to kindergarten. Family engagement is an element of Story Times/Wiggle Worms as the staff of the Children's Department model ways and offer tips to parents on how to involve books in their family's lives at home. Not every family comes from a background aware of the essential

value of reading to a child to build vocabulary, or how to prepare a groundwork for phonics, letter

recognition and the decoding that will be the basis of successful learning to read in school.

Another School Readiness library effort that addresses this integral part of its mission is the do-it-yourself program that specifically targets the 0-5 age range: 1000 Books before Kindergarten. Read about it on Page 7

curriculum, available within all 13 libraries. Designed to help young children (ages 2-6+) build a strong foundation for future academic success, ABC Mouse is 100% educational, with 3,500+ learning activities across all major subject areas—reading, math, science, social studies, art, and music. Best of all, kids love it. The Library offers this access to parents to promote school readiness and not just literacy but digital literacy.



FRIENDS OF THE MODESTO LIBRARY EFFORTS

In support of the mission of the library, FOML's efforts enable a number of literacy programs at the Modesto Library and in the wider community. Many of them speak to the Stanislaus READS! School Readiness goal of "Increasing Access to Books."

SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR NOVEMBER 4, 5 and 7

This fundraiser is also a literacy event in that it offers a convenient outlet for high quality, low-cost books. FOML's profit from the sale generates books for the library collection and programs. Not only that, but "Wish Lists" for local youth agencies bring in donated funds used to place books into the hands of our community's children beyond the library. Those groups include: Children's Crisis Center, Family Literacy Program – LearningQuest, Haven Women's Center, Hutton House, Parent Resource Center, Red Shield Center, Redwood Family Center and Sierra Vista Child & Family Services.

DÍA DE LOS NIÑOS/ DÍA DE LOS LIBROS

Day of the Child/Day of the Book celebrates the importance of reading in the lives of our children. This annual April event at many of the county libraries is funded at Modesto by FOML. Last year nearly 400 Modesto children received free books supplied by FOML.

POP-UP COLLECTIONS

New Youth Services Outreach Librarian Olga Cardenas has begun taking the library outside its walls to places where children may not have easy access to library services and thus increasing their access to books. For example, Cardenas is doing informal story times and signing up families for library cards at the WIC [Women and Infant Children] office. The Friends have donated \$3,000 this year that will, among other things, establish a collection of story time books to use in this program.

IMAGINATION LIBRARY

Not technically a library program, this part of Stanislaus READS! fits so securely into School Readiness that FOML donated \$1,500 to the cause. <u>Page 5</u>

HOW YOU CAN HELP

If you understand the profound effect on our community of children starting school unprepared to learn to read, there are several things you can do.

- Read to your child. Or any child!

Imagination Library



magine...a book delivered each month to a child, from birth to age 5, creating a personal library of 60 books by kindergarten! The program, Imagination Library, makes this possible. And it can provide all this for \$150 per child, or, on a smaller scale, \$25 a year.

As with all worthy programs, it is only limited by funding. Fundraising is underway in Modesto, with grants providing seed money to get five schools up and running this past summer. Moon School in Waterford, Chrysler in Salida, Las Palmas in Patterson, and Burbank and Sylvan Schools in Modesto are piloting the program in Stanislaus County. Volunteers are signing up families, with books beginning to arrive in July.

With each book comes activity ideas. Volunteers will meet with families to give tips on reading to young children, emphasizing the benefits of early reading and book handling.

Statistics tell us that only 53% of children in Stanislaus County, ages 0 to 5, are read to every day. What better way to improve this than help these families build libraries and give them support to create a positive, able reader!

Friends of the Modesto Library is helping with a \$1,500 donation. We are excited to be a part of this endeavor and look forward to hearing stories of progress.

EARLY LITERACY



Read! Seed! Grow!

N o successful garden will grow without proper seeds and the nourishments of sun and water. The same is true of a successful start in school: Books are the seeds, reading is the water and parents are the sun in a child's life. The library's 1000 Books Before Kindergarten initiative is a little fertilizer to encourage growth toward school success.

Reading and sharing books helps develop key pre-literacy skills. The more words a child hears, the better the preparation for learning to read. 1000 Books Before Kindergarten is a free, do-it-yourself program designed for infants, toddlers, and preschool-age children. After picking up a packet at the library, the simple steps are read books together, mark off a "leaf" on a log for every book read, and come in for a sticker and a new reading log after the first 100 books. Parents are surprised how quickly the first log is finished! Once you complete reading 1000 books your child will receive a special prize and a wonderful head start to success in school.

Besides the first log, the program packet includes a description of how it works and two pamphlets: one with tips for reading aloud and one with the top 10 facts parents should know about the benefits of reading to young children. Read any book — as many times as you want. If every young child in Stanislaus County was read to 10-15 minutes a day, just think of the tremendous impact it would have on school success and the literacy of our community. 1000 Books Before Kindergarten is one way to encourage that.

Do your part: Pass the word. Do you have a child, grandchild, niece/ nephew, cousin, friend or neighbor from birth to pre-kindergarten age? This program is for them. Make that plural: Pass the *words* – to our next generations.

Building a home library for your child

s a retired children's librarian I am often asked by parents, "What are the best books to have at home?" I have my personal favorites, but I think any child with at least these four kinds of books has a better start at success in school and thus in life:
Bedtime book [for parent/child bonding during a consistent quiet time]

- Mother Goose book [this develops an awareness of rhyming sounds]
- ABC book [to start the "decoding" that sounds = letters]
- Word book [with named pictures of things to build vocabulary]



My favorites for these? The classic bedtime book "Goodnight Moon" by Margaret Wise Brown and the Mother Goose illustrated by Rosemary Wells spring to mind. I'd suggest that a word book be in boardbook format so little hands can turn the pages themselves. As for ABC books, there are too many good ones to recommend just one. Look through the library's collection and choose one that appeals to you and your child.

A home library is an asset for all children, whether they are developing their early literacy skills, learning to read, or reading to learn. If you, your family, a neighbor or a friend are looking for a resource to help in the process, here is a link to four Building a Home Library bibliographies created by the American Library Association and Children's Book Council. They provide a guide in assembling a high-quality



library for children to own at home. The lists are for children birth-3, ages 4-7, 8-11 and 12-14.

More books in the hands of more kids is my motto!
