LIBRARY PROVIDES SPACE FOR LITERACY PROGRAMS

he area near The Little Shop inside the library is probably familiar to you, but you might have wondered what, exactly, goes on in the cubicles and adjacent office.

Here, LearningQuest volunteer tutors work one-on-one with adults to improve their reading and writing skills. Some of these individuals are preparing to transfer to the HSE (High School Equivalency) program to earn their GEDs. Others are English language learners who are working to become fluent and literate in their adopted tongue.

Illiteracy is a big problem in Stanislaus County. More than 100,000 adults in our county have difficulty using an ATM machine or reading a bus schedule.

Not being able to read well affects everything from a person's ability to find a job, to read to their child, to filling out health forms. Stanislaus Literacy Center has partnered with Stanislaus County Library to provide the LearningQuest Adult Literacy program at the library which offers free educational services to adults.

Volunteers are recruited and trained to work individually with adult learners and help them learn to read and write in a way that will allow them to achieve their goals. Free curriculum materials are provided to assist tutors.

Together, the tutor and learner set goals and begin a partnership of learning that literally changes the life of the adult learner.

For LearningQuest, the library is a safe public place for tutors and students to work together. For the library, the partnership helps to fulfill its outreach goals. It's a great partnership. For more information about LearningQuest or becoming a tutor, visit <u>http://lqslc.com/</u>

ne of several smiling faces you'll see when visiting the Children's Department at the Modesto Library is staffer Jessica Molina.

You might find her at the children's reference desk assisting children and their families locating library materials and helping with other library services. Or, as one of the department's bilingual storytellers, she could be leading a weekly Spanish or bilingual story time. Or she might be participating in an outreach event such as the Stanislaus County Fair, Earth Day Celebration and other community events sharing information with the public about the library's programs and services.

Molina, who has worked as a library assistant I in the Children's Department for more than three

"I have also had the opportunity to go out to schools to assist my coworkers in Early Literacy presentations where we delivered a bilingual presentation to parents."

Secrets of the Modesto Library



Special Collections

here's a locked door in our Modesto library (well, usually locked) that provides access to the Stanislaus Room. In the Stanislaus Room you will find Special Collections on genealogy research, history of California and cities and counties within the State, and the history of Stanislaus County and its towns.

To gain entrance, just ask at the Reference Desk. No password needed! A reference librarian will let you into Special Collections, located along the back wall of the library to the right of the



Genealogy Society members help out with the special collections.

Then I checked out Maryland marriages in the late 1600s and 1700s to see if I recognized any Hawkins ancestors.

Within the California shelves I discovered The Complete Story of the San Francisco Horror by the survivors and the rescuers of the 1906 earthquake. It features personal experiences and amazing photographs. A thorough reading will help me understand what my then 19-year-old grandfather experienced. Lastly, I took a peek in the small room off to the left which contains Stanislaus County

history (including cities, river and

Reference Desk and computer area. If you happen to visit on a Monday between 10 and 3ish there is no need to ask at the Reference Desk since the room will be open and staffed with Genealogy Society volunteers.

The collection, which includes 5,480 books and pamphlets and newsletters such as Stepping Stones from the Stanislaus Historical Society, contains reference material for in-library use only.

It is the perfect place for genealogy and history sleuthing. You can use a catalog or just browse the clearly marked shelves. I recently took a few minutes to discover what I could find out about my family. The first book off the shelf let me know the areas in Ireland my Gleason and Egan ancestors called home. cemeteries).

I spent a few minutes visiting with Marilyn Belleville, a volunteer from the Genealogical Society of Stanislaus who has been doing genealogy for 40 years. Most Monday visitors, she says, start off with some version of "I'm trying to trace my family." She will explain what is available and even provide tips on how to organize information and access free genealogy web sites. Marilyn encourages people not to wait until retirement to start gathering family history since by that time key family members have usually died. She would like to see teenagers help by interviewing parents, grandparents and other relatives for oral or written histories.
