These are numbers to be proud of

Tappy New Year! I'm pleased to share some impressive numbers passed on by County Librarian Diane McDonnell from the annual report for fiscal year 2013-2014.

These numbers and statistics provide a bigger picture of what our library system is doing for all of

- In Stanislaus County 16,157 library cards were issued, increasing the percentage of library card holders to 74 percent of county residents.
- 1,997,909 resources were checked out.
- There was a 48 percent increase in the number of programs offered from 607 to 896.



- •There was an 87 percent increase in program attendance to 14,218 in 2013-2014.
- Book circulation is up 140 percent to 28,174. The eBook collection has more than 5,500 items.
- eMagazines circulation through the new Zinio service that began in April 2014 is 1,546.
- Our digital wifi wireless logins are up 17.7 percent to 22,710.

We are grateful for all the Stanislaus County libraries have done and continue to do.

Also, thank you to the Stanislaus Library Foundation and Friends of the Library groups for contributing to programs, library materials, equipment and more.

Zuckerberg's Book Club

Ark Zuckerberg, the founder and CEO of Facebook, has made a New Year's resolution that may bring a smile to your face or a nod to the idea. He has vowed to read a book every two weeks during 2015 and he has invited people around the world to join him. Zuckerberg is calling his resolution the "year of books." He has made other quirky resolutions, including his 2014 promise of writing a thank-you note every day or his 2013 challenge to meet a new person every day.

His first book choice is "The End of Power" subtitled "Why Being In Charge Isn't What It Used To Be"

by Moises Naim. The 300-page book is a look into the changing nature of leadership. It was published in 2013.

"Books allow you to fully explore a topic and immerse yourself in a deeper way than most media today," Zuckerberg wrote. To support a book club conversation about the books Zuckerberg reads, he has launched a Facebook page, "A Year of Books," that will serve as the reading group's main hub. As of Jan. 1 more than 62,000 people have liked the page.

Zuckerberg has made one request for his followers. "Please only participate in the discussions if you've actually read the books and have relevant points to add. The group will be moderated to keep it focused." Zuckerberg plans to select books about various topics and cultures.



Thus, she began her career in the Children's Department, where she has been for most of her 14 years on the job.

Amber is part of the programming team for the Modesto Library's

and Preschool Story Times. She prides herself on the fact that these sessions are more than just reading a book. Both programs involve flannel boards, finger plays, music, and following direction. It isn't just children who benefit from Story

Time. Parents acquire tips on early literacy during the program.

Amber's newest book recommendations include "Princess in Black," an EZ Reader featuring a princess Ninja, and "El Deafo," a graphic novel about the challenges facing a deaf girl in the late 1960s. Each book features a spunky girl who challenges stereotypes by being herself.

Amber's passion for her job is apparent. She encourages all parents to read to their children for as long as possible. When children get "too old" for story time, Amber suggests sharing audiobooks that can be listened to together and enjoyed as a family.

To sum up Amber O'Brien-VerHulst's passion for her job, listen to one of her favorite quotes: "Children are made readers on the laps of their parents." (Emile Buchwald).

Children's library conference filled with ideas

ast September I was fortunate to attend the Association for Library Service to Children's (ALSC) National Institute held in Oakland. This is one of the few conferences devoted to children's librarianship, and it is held every two years. The Ceres Friends of the Library graciously sent me to this conference.

It was an amazing experience, one I will never forget. I attended some wonderful and informative sessions including how to think outside the storytime box, design easy programming for discerning tweens, access technology on a budget, and incorporate science, technology, engineering, art, and math (STEAM) into library programs.

I also learned about how to collaborate with other early childhood educators, advocate for the library and our services, use volunteers to expand early literacy

and storytime accessibility, and increase access to books for younger children.

I gained ideas for fun and simple programs I could do on my own, such as dance parties for toddlers and book parties to celebrate a particular literary character. I also learned about larger, more involved programs for systemwide implementation, such as the Books For Wider Horizons program that was presented by the Oakland Public Library staff.

I made connections with some fabulous and interesting individuals who are passionate about children's services, including the president and vice-president of ALSC, who, after I explained that the Ceres Friends Group sent me to the conference, spoke eloquently of the importance of our Friends groups and how we couldn't get along without them.

Attending this conference was a wonderful opportunity for me. I made new friends, networked with leaders in children's services, met amazing children's book authors, and gained a whole new appreciation for my profession. It was exactly the kind of inspiration I was looking for to enhance my education and renew my enthusiasm as an informational specialist and early literacy educator.

It only makes sense — apps for book lovers

True book lovers know that smart phones can't replace your book collection, but they are a great tool to supplement and enhance it. Owning a smart phone means that you can read books, organize them, or stay up to date on the latest best sellers. There's an app for every need.

Goodreads: Book lovers never have to feel alone if they have Goodreads installed. This popular website also has an app that connects users with a large population of readers and their reviews. The app includes a barcode scanner to catalog your library, so you can share your collection, likes and thoughts with

your friends or other readers. Book news, trends, a wish list and social network are in one place. Free.

iReaditNow: If you are looking for cataloging options, try iReaditNow. The app helps you keep track of the books you own, have read, want to read or are reading. It supports statistics, searching within your collection. You can even add notes and favorite passages from your books. Free.

Google Play Books: Google eBook users have access to more than 2 million titles. Take them with you on your iPhone and read them any time you like. The app syncs with

any Google Books library so you can keep all of your books on hand, updated bookmarks and all. Free.

Audible-Digital Audiobooks by Audible, Inc.: If you would like to listen to a book, you'll want to set up an Audible account and this app. This program is a subscription-based service, so it will cost you to hear a celebrity read your book.

Stanislaus County Library: Remember you can download books through our own county library system, too. A good selection of books that is expanding constantly to meet the readers' needs.

Enjoy a good book no matter what resource you use.


