Library staff get creative to deliver programs despite COVID-19

The pandemic may have closed the library's doors for the time being, but there's still plenty to keep young minds active. In September and October, FOML sponsored STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) Kit giveaways, to provide families the materials and instructions they need to engineer their own crafty creations. The kits, which ranged from Chenille Stem Butterflies to Egg Shakers and Rainbow Ornaments, will continue to be given out twice a month through November. Library staffers have assembled several hundred



kits so far. Modesto Library Manager Chris Moreno said, "We also contact the Farmers Market to let them know when we are handing out the STEAM Kits. They'll take a few flyers and samples to show off at their table, too. We have gotten really nice feedback from Farmers Market and those who take the kits."

More FOML-sponsored programs are in the works, including a **Dinosaur Mosaic**: Modesto Children's staff (Amber and Angelica) plan to create a pixel art dinosaur mosaic using post-it notes on one of the large windows for **DINOvember**.

And on Saturday, November 14, FOML is sponsoring a Virtual Art Class with artist Barbara Freiberg on ZOOM at 1 p.m. Barbara will be teaching participants how to use watercolor pencils to draw a Frida Kahlo-inspired still life picture. Attendance will be capped at 25 participants and signups will be required in





advance.FOML will cover the cost of art paper and Crayola watercolor pencils for attendees to pick up if they need them.

When the library reopens, visitors will be greeted with several new items in the Children's Library, including a new Truck Cabinet for the Children's toddler area, and new chairs and stools, all purchased with funds donated by FOML.


Membership Update

READING RECOMMENDATIONS So many books... but where to begin?

Librarians come to the rescue with personalized reading recommendations.

Plenty of time (thank you, COVID), but not sure what to read next? Never fear! The Stanislaus County Library is offering online Reading Recommendations, free for the asking. Reference Librarian Vicki Salinas says that while the online format has been in the works for some time, the pandemic era proved to be the perfect time for the program's debut. Within a week of its late September launch and with no publicity other than a brief story and link on the library's home page, more than 25 people had submitted requests. Repeat customers are already showing up.

Librarians have always been go-to people on what-to-read, but Reading Recommendations digs deeper into your likes and dislikes. Vicki uses staff system-wide for recommendations, since most are readers and good at reader's advisory. She often turns to the librarians who select certain genres for the system and can count on the Children's Department to know what titles are best for children and teens. For the most part Vicki tries to recommend books that are checked in and available at one of the branches. It's easy to do: start with the questionnaire (https://bit.ly/348MuSS) on the library's website (Stanislauslibrary.org). The more information you provide about your likes and dislikes, the better.

I filled out the form and was very specific about the genres and authors I enjoy and why I like the authors, such as mystery writers Louise Penny and Donna Leon for thoughtful main character development. I also noted historical fiction and two authors I had recently read and enjoyed, Ann Patchett and Sue Monk Kidd. The five recommendations were: *The Known World* by Edward P. Jones, *The Guest List* by Lucy Foley, *The Thirteenth Tale* by Diane Setterfield, *Her Last Flight* by Beatriz Williams and *The Art of Hearing Heartbeats* by Jan-Philipp Sendker, all of which I look forward to reading.

Turn-around time can vary but is usually only two to three business days. There is no limit on how often you can use the service and you don't even have to be a library card holder.

While library staff really misses customer contact, they hope this program will enrich library experiences by allowing customers to discover books within the library's extensive collection that they can enjoy now and when libraries reopen.

Summer Shoppers and Donors

Even without a room to shop in, our shopping Friends brought in nearly \$1,200 worth of credit with Scholastic at the May and summer Virtual Scholastic Book Fairs. And many of you made donations for books purchased in a fantastic collaboration.

Here are the results of your generosity:

 645 books were given to 90 children of more than 40 adult literacy students

through a leveraged collaboration with LearningQuest's Giving Tree Book Drive.

• 186 books purchased with the credit earned will be delivered by the library to children at "feeding schools" during visits from library staff this fall.

The warm feeling that comes from knowing a child has a book to read just can't be beat. Well done, Friends!

Finding a title missing from the results of your library catalog search? If so, consider participating in Zip Books. That is what I did. After confirming that my book, "Punch Needle,"

by Arounna Khounnoraj was available through Amazon Prime, I completed the simple request form located under the *Zip Books* heading on the second swipe of the Library mobile app that I have on my iPhone.

Within a couple of days I received an email from the Library notifying me that my request was approved and I would receive the book in the mail within 5-7 days. Actual delivery time was two days so the whole process from idea to book in hand was one week!


I brought my book to the Modesto branch after a generous six weeks of enjoyment. Staff has found that the trust in the community to comply with returns has been well placed. They appreciate the inclusion of a post-it note identifying it as a Zip Book.

I am hoping that other patrons will be able to enjoy this book too as punch needle is a trending revived craft and the author known to her 232,000 Instagram followers as Bookhou has written a lovely and useful book.

According to librarian Christopher Dear, coordinator of the Stanislaus Co. Library Zip Book program, about 60% of the books ordered through Zip Books are ultimately added to the Library's collection.

The general criteria for approving a request is minimal once it is confirmed that the title is not owned by the Library and is available on Amazon Prime. Almost all requests are currently approved. Non-fiction titles makeup 75% of requests.

Not all books are actually cataloged, however a book needs to be constructed to physically withstand the wear and tear of multiple check outs and enhance the Library's existing collection. Gardening and crafting books are



usually added, "non-fiction" alien conspiracy theory type books and other "self-published" titles not so often. Uncatalogued books are donated to the Friends of the Modesto Library for its annual book sale.

The main financial support for the Zip Books program comes from the "Grants to States Program" of the federal agency *U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services.* The California State Librarian disburses the funds under the provisions of the California Library Services and Technology Act. Zip Books began as a successful 2011-12 pilot project in Butte, Humboldt, and Shasta County Library Systems. Designed to provide an alternative model for InterLibrary Loan (ILL) services, the Project was expanded in 2013.

Christopher Dear explained that while our library enjoys offering Zip Books, our system has experienced no appreciable decline in interlibrary loans. Now serving 74 California library systems, the Stanislaus County Library joined the program in April 2019. Since then our library has acquired about 2,500 books for patrons and is currently averaging 80-90 books per month. With a budget of \$2,000 per month there has been no financial obstacle meeting requests. The cost to our local

Library is for staff time only.

Library customer Vickie Higginbotham, a Zip Books user, feels that the program "expands the opportunity for the community to be part of the ordering department." Chris Moreno, supervisor of the Modesto branch, adds that staff "book selectors can look at trends from requests that come on particular subjects, whether political or gardening, consider if the collection is lacking, and fill in holes in the Library's own collection." This was another goal of the Zip Books pilot project, a patron driven collection.

Zip Books is an apt name for a program designed to get books in the hands of patrons quickly. The program has definitely lived up to that goal. And the zippiness will continue, as the program was recently approved to continue through 2021. Zip!
