Meet Lucinda Scanlon, who has a claim to fame that is certainly unique: Lucinda is one of the few people who can say they worked at both the "old" Modesto Library and the "new" library, which opened 50 years ago in November 1971. And still fewer can also claim they met their life partner at the library!

Lucinda loves books and libraries!

Her mother, Doris Scanlon, introduced Lucinda and her younger sister Melinda (who is currently Branch Librarian in Ripon) to the Children's Department at the Modesto Library on the corner of 14th and I Streets—now the McHenry Museum—at very young age. That's how she got to know Children's Librarian Kathryn Thornburg.

Lucinda's love of reading and frequent library visits led to Miss Thornburg hiring her as a children's department page in the fall of 1968. She worked 15 hours a week at \$1.35 an hour. Lucinda kept that job until the fall of 1972, so her employment history includes the old and the new libraries.

Lucinda liked being a page, especially at the McHenry Library, and said it was an honor and privilege working for Miss Thornburg. She spent her hours

shelving books and shelf-reading (making Lucinda especially remembers the sure all the books were in their proper order), a task she really didn't enjoy. Other tasks were recommending books and helping customers to find them on the shelves, and mending children's books, a task she really enjoyed.

Her favorite job perk was access to new books. Her work week included some afternoons and evenings and every other Saturday. She left the job after her freshman year at Modesto Junior College.

coziness of the McHenry Library Children's Department. Located in the basement, the children's department was away from the adult and reference areas. "It was children's scale," she adds.

When the new library opened in November 1971, she recalls the new children's room as big and sterile, making it difficult in the beginning for employees to connect with customers. The main part of the library also felt big and cold with

none of the charm of the old library, according to Lucinda.

However, the new library does hold a special memory for Lucinda. It was there that she met her husband, Robert Vore, in late 1971 when he worked as a library clerk. They have been married almost 50 years and live on a cattle ranch in northeastern Wyoming close to the South Dakota border.

Lucinda's early love of books and libraries and her four-year stint at the Modesto Library influenced her career path. She holds a Masters in Library and Information Science from the University of South Carolina. She continues to love reading (she just finished Louise Penny's newest book) and has an extensive private library, which comes in handy when you live in a remote location.

Q&A with Michele Bertolero, Clerical Division Supervisor

FOML: Michele, please tell us about your role at the Library.

MB: As Clerical Division Supervisor, I oversee system-wide circulation. My duties include managing the circulation procedures of the library, supervising the work of Modesto Circulation Department's staff, and coordinating and supervising the Library's Substitutes who provide staffing for all 13 branches. I have been in this position since summer 2018.

FOML: What did you do before that?

MB: For ten years prior to my promotion, I worked happily on the circulation desk at the Modesto Library and supervised the Modesto Pages (clerical community aids). In those years, I had the wonderful opportunity to work with and learn from my fabulous predecessor, Kathryn Davis. She taught me that customer service is our top priority and I try to live by this. Library customers are the reason that I have a job that I still look forward to going to after fifteen years.

FOML: In the time you have worked at the library, what has changed and improved in the area of circulation.

MB: I have seen many changes over the years but the role of technology has brought about the biggest changes throughout the library system, as it has the world. For instance, when I first started, every individual item was scanned by hand; now, we check out stacks of items just by setting them on the counter (RFID pad). This upgrade allowed us to install selfcheckout machines which, during the COVID shutdown, were an integral reason we were able to continue getting library materials into customers' hands.



Because of advances in technology, we now are able to offer popular e-services like Cloud Library, Hoopla, Flipster and many informational databases, all of which can be checked out without ever visiting the circulation desk, and without incurring late fees. These resources are exciting to me, because when I first came to work for the library a VHS was the best option if you wanted to watch a movie. I still remember the excitement of our first DVD collection, and the chaos of organizing this new collection for circulation. Oh, and all Modesto Library card applications are now done paperless (digitally).

FOML: Why is the library such a great place to work?

MB: I'm surrounded by books, information, knowledge and people who are in search of these same things. The library is filled with wonderful staff who want to meet the needs of their community as best they can. It is a safe place to explore new interests and ideas, to read a book, to study, to gather with friends, to engage in our great programming, etc. ▶

FOML: What are some of the challenges?

MB: Budget issues. The 1/8-cent library tax doesn't stretch as far as it once did. Besides that, there really are very few challenges that cannot be solved through good internal and external customer service.

FOML: Please say a little about your work on Measure S and anything you would like people to know about that effort.

MB: My family and I proudly worked alongside many FOML members on two campaigns (Measures T and S) to renew the library tax that funds most of our library's day-to-day operations. I canvassed neighborhoods and talked to voters about how important the library services are, and what they mean to our community. I also made hundreds (if not thousands) of calls to voters reminding them to get out and vote.

FOML: What role do you think Friends of the Library play for the Library?

MB: The Friends are huge library-

community advocates. Their financial support gives our library the flexibility to do programming like the popular Summer Reading Program and extra support for display materials. They are also responsible for the beautiful new fish tank which our patrons are enjoying, young and old alike.

FOML: Please tell us a little more about yourself, Michele. Hobbies? Family? Pets?

MB: When I am away from the library, I love spending time with my family. I enjoy being outside and Yosemite is my favorite place. I love gardening, camping, hiking, biking, walking with my husband, listening to baseball on the radio and of course reading!! I love classics, historical fiction, contemporary fiction, romance, nonfiction, YA, etc. My favorite book is The Winter of Our Discontent by John Steinbeck and my new favorite author is Christina Lauren (thanks for the recommendation, Michele Machado, Children's Librarian). We have two awesome dogs, Kali and her new sister, Mikasa. And two cool, orange cats, Scully and Mulder.
